Camp Infrastructure Work – End-of-Year Matching Challenge!

In preparation for the construction of new cabins [see article on Page 3], we will be completing some significant infrastructure work this winter, including updating the Camp electrical system (capacity and safety features), removing trees, and digging trenches for water, sewer and electrical services. The work must be done during the off-season because it will require power outages. The plan is to begin the work in early 2020. This work will cost \$75,000. Some funds have already been donated to support this. One donor has stepped forward and agreed to give \$25,000 as a matching challenge. For every dollar donated, they will match it ONE for ONE.



Capital Campaign Update

After concluding Phase 1 of the Campaign (debt retired in December 2018!), we are moving enthusiastically into Phase 2, which will include the updating of Camp infra-structure and the construction of new cabins. We have already received some cash and financial pledges toward the construction of new cabins. But, as promised by the Board, construction of new cabins will not begin until funds to cover their full construction have been raised.

2019 has been a year of preparation. We are working with an architect to finalize cabin layouts. Approvals are being sought from the township. In winter 2019/2020, extensive infrastructure work will commence before the first cabins can be built: completely updating the Camp electrical system, removing trees, and digging trenches for water/sewer/electrical services. We are doing this upfront work for all cabins at once in order to save money overall.


If everything goes well with the prep-work and fundraising, it is our intent to construct the first new cabins after the conclusion of 2020 Summer Sessions.




The design of the new cabins will strive to preserve many of the positive elements of the existing cabins while incorporating innovations that will make the new cabins available for year-round activities.

The plan is for the new cabins to:

- co-exist and be used with the rustic cabins for some time;
- be situated in the same horseshoe layout;
- have a rustic look, low maintenance exterior, & durable interior;
- have two sides, each containing bunks for 10 to 12 campers + 2 counselors for Summer Sessions;
- have an interior layout similar to the old cabins (e.g. circle of bunks where everyone is visible and can easily interact);
- support handicap access (some will be ADA compliant);
- be climate-controlled;
- have bathroom facilities on both sides; and,
- have a meeting room and front and back porches as areas to gather.

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
Notes of Thanks

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Reflections of a Long-Serving Horse-Wrangler



My wife Deanna and I first learned of Camp Manatawny in the mid-1980's. We were visiting with Dwight and Barbie Smith (Tabernacle, NJ) in the auditorium of the College Church in Searcy, AR. Two college students from the Pennsylvania area came over to see the Smiths. In the course of the conversation Dwight asked, "How was your summer

camp experience?" As they talked, tears and stories flowed from them. I found myself wondering: "What kind of camp is this?" What I would come to learn over 30 years of service is that this is a camp where all different kinds of people could come together to learn about God, grow in their faith, and build spiritual relationships that can help to sustain you for the rest of your life. It is a place where lives are changed.

Fast forward the story to the spring of 1987. My company, Rohm and Haas, relocated us to PA, so I could begin a lab job in our Ag. Chemical research labs. Early in the summer of 1989, I was talking to Lynn Evans, the long-time director of Elementary 1, about how his camp preparation was going. He said he needed some counselors, a Bible teacher or two and a horse wrangler. In hindsight, I asked a pretty dumb gues-

tion, "What does a horse wrangler do?" Lynn said that he feeds and cares for the horses, cleans the corral, and provides a chance for each camper to get one or two horseback rides." I had a little experience giving horseback rides to my younger cousins back in the day, so I volunteered. Deanna volunteered to teach Bible classes. When that first week at Camp came to an end, we were exhausted, but we were also hooked. I just didn't yet realize



the hook was so big and set so deep. This past summer was 30 years for me as horse-wrangler for Elementary 1 and 17 years for Junior High 1, as well as a few years at Intermediate 2, plus Family Camp, and 13 years with Camp Sunshine.



During all these years, I began to notice a pattern: so many of those young campers were now coming back as dishwashers, dining hall helpers, and horse wranglers just so they could spend more time at Camp. As time progressed, I watched them become junior counselors, and then counselors. Eventually they became college students like the ones who had first told us about the impact of this camp, coming back summer after summer to work at Camp.

In my job as horse wrangler, I worked closest with junior staff. These 12-15 year-olds led horses, cleaned corrals, and helped others to do their other jobs at Camp. I estimate that the number of help-

ers I worked with exceeds 60-70, even with those who worked multiple years. Working with horses in the summer heat is not always easy or pleasant work. It could often get pretty messy, but, year after year, I saw kids willing to do

anything (even cleaning those corrals) to spend just a little more time at Camp. They were becoming hooked on Camp just like I had been. It didn't matter what decade we were in or how many things had changed around us, year after year there were kids hungry for the life-changing impact of Camp.

The ways Camp has impacted me over all these years are too numerous to count, but one that deserves special attention is the spiritual relationships that I was blessed to form with many wonderful people. There were countless conversations with spiritual leaders of so many of our churches just sitting around together on the old rec hall porch or on the benches outside the canteen. We covered many diverse topics, unusual questions were asked, and thoughtful answers were given. Many of those answers would then lead to more discussions. We also shared our lives with one another, prayed together, and supported each other through





both good and hard times. I realized that I relished these conversations and yearned for them year after year. They were spiritually sustaining for me.

After so many years at Camp Manatawny, I am left with immense feelings of gratitude, but the two words "Thank you" seem so inadequate. We all owe a great debt to all of the dreamers who stepped out in faith over 50 years ago to make this camp a reality. We owe thanks to everyone who has served on the board over the years, to all the staff that dedicate their time and hard work, and to all the generous supporters who provide funding for the good work done at Camp. But, most of all, we owe thanks to our God who has blessed us with a place that, no matter how many years go by, still brings together so many different people to learn about God, grow in faith, and build sustaining spiritual relationships—a place where our lives can be transformed.

Restoring the Beloved Retreat Center


